RE: Development Impact Fees

Impact fees are one-time charges assessed by a local government against a new development project to help pay for new or expanded public capital facilities that will directly address the increased demand for services created by that development. City Council is considering impact fees to help offset cost associated with residential growth and requested the planning commission assess the need of impact fees particularly to address transportation improvements.

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RE: Climate Planning

Legislation passed and signed into law in 2023 (<u>HB 1181</u>) adds a climate goal to the Growth Management Act (GMA) and requires local comprehensive plans to have a climate element with resilience and greenhouse gas emissions mitigation sub-elements.

- The resilience sub-element must include goals and polices to improve climate preparedness, response and recovery efforts. This is mandatory for all counties and cities fully planning under the GMA and encouraged for others.
- Climate elements must maximize economic, environmental, and social cobenefits and prioritize environmental justice in order to avoid worsening environmental health disparities.

Christina Wollman of Preteet Inc. will provide an overview of the tasks and timelines to complete the climate planning element.
